TXOR pass-through revenue and expenses reflect federal refugee service funds administered by Catholic Charities Fort Worth through TXOR and distributed to partner agencies statewide. CCFW will continue administering remaining federal funds to ensure eligible refugee families across Texas experience no disruption in services and does not plan to continue the statewide administrative role once all funds have been fully administered.

Our dental clinic provided care at reduced cost for **1,279 underinsured individuals**—removing pain, restoring health, and rebuilding confidence.

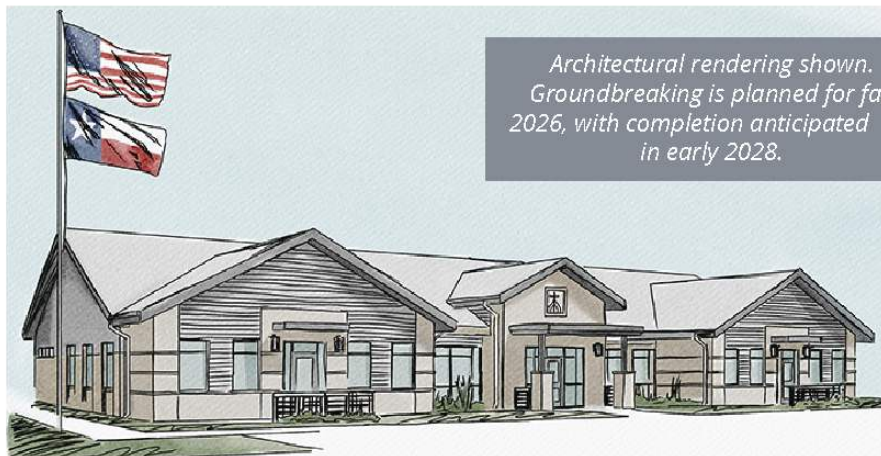
For more than 40 years, we have delivered immigration legal services—helping families receive low-cost legal services. Last year we helped **4,181 individuals**.



Transportation removes one of the greatest barriers to employment, healthcare, and independence. Through door-to-door service we helped **1,413 neighbors** keep moving forward with dignity.

2014,

our Northwest Campus in Wichita Falls has served families, students, veterans, and neighbors experiencing poverty. With poverty rates remaining higher than the state average, the need continues to grow. Our Building Hope Campaign will create a permanent 6,500 square foot campus, bringing services and partners together under one roof.
